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Making inferences is a comprehension

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strategy used by proficient readers to “read between the lines,” make connections, and draw conclusions about the text’s meaning and purpose. You already make inferences all of the time. For example, imagine you go over to a friend’s house and they point at the sofa and say, “Don’t sit there, Cindy came over with her baby again.”.

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Making Inferences | Developmental Reading

Making an inference involves using what you know to make a guess about what you don't know or reading between the lines. Readers who make inferences use the clues in the text along with their own experiences to help them figure out

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what is not directly said, making the text personal and memorable.

Making inferences requires students to combine what they are reading with what they already know, to reach into their own personal knowledge and apply it to what they are reading. In the previous example, a student needs to

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know that having a bathing suit means someone is going swimming and that getting seasick means someone is going on a boat.

Making Inferences to Improve Reading Comprehension

Inference can be defined as the process of drawing of a conclusion based on the

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available evidence plus previous knowledge and experience. In teacher-speak, inference questions are the types of questions that involve reading between the lines. Students are required to make an educated guess, as the answer will not be stated explicitly. Students must use clues from the text, coupled with their own experiences, to

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draw a logical conclusion.
