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The Republic is the masterpiece of Plato's political thought, and the related arguments of which it is composed, converge upon its advocacy of the conjunction of political power and philosophy. This proposal is a signpost which indicates that the principles underlying the order of the ideal commonwealth delineated in the Republic are inextricably linked to the general principles

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embraced in Plato's philosophizing.
